A big "THANK YOU" to Crail Primary school for their colourful entries to the Doocot Poster Competition. Judging is taking place and the results will be announced in November.

#### Crail Churchyard.

Take a walk round Crail churchyard and enjoy the peace among the stones which contain so much history. You don't have to keep to the path but take a wander along by the walls and admire the Memorials....local family names and occupations are there. At the north-west corner to the left of the Dead House (a story for another day) you will see the Airdrie family Memorial dated 1598. Now look up and see the damage being caused to the stonework where neglected plant roots are forcing the masonry apart. This is only one of the many pieces of our past being destroyed.

Our churchyard is said to be second in importance in Scotland to Greyfriars, Edinburgh. A specialist survey has now been received and indicates which memorials are at the greatest risk.

Crail Preservation Society intend to take this forward, and apply for grants to help pay for conservation work which is beyond amateur skills. Fife Council are intending to start work first on the cordoned off area.

The Museum has detailed information on many of the families and the location of the gravestones.

#### **Donation of engraved Gavel to the Community Council**

A gavel, engraved with the inscription 'The Royal Burgh of Crail and District Community Council 2018' has been donated to the Community Council. Associated with the donation was the comment 'to help the chair keep order in troubling times' It was first used to signal the opening of the inaugural meeting 2018.



#### **Common Good application Crail Preservation Society**

The Preservation Society sought agreement from the Community Council for £6,000

from Crail Common Good Fund to construct a new stone wall to protect the outside perimeter of the new access path to the refurbished Doocot. This follows from advice from the Architect bearing in mind the Doocot is an A-listed building, and is a necessary safety feature to retain the banking created by the earlier excavated ground in the formation of the new entrance pathway providing disabled access. The original intention was to plant hedging, but it has been found that the ground below is formed of rock making any planting an impossibility. The Community Council unanimously approved the application.

#### Letter to the Editor

I was taken aback by last week's article about student distortion of the housing market in St Andrews firstly because, along with everyone I have spoken to about it including St Andrews residents, can't understand where the Guardian (source of the original article) got its figures from – the population of St Andrews is surely a lot larger than 7000. From Fife council website, the population of St Andrews area in 2011 (at the last census) was 27199. Even if you subtract 9000 students, that still leaves 18000+.

Secondly if student HMOs are exempt from council tax, the council must know how many there are and therefore surely, as a councillor, Linda Holt could find these figures and the statement "nobody knows how many student HMOs there

are" is nonsense.

Lastly, there seem to me that there are three main "industries" in St Andrews and the surrounding villages – the University, golf and tourism. A reduction in students would lead to a reduction in university staff which in turn would reduce the non-student population just as much as alienating folks with holiday homes in the area reduces the amount taken in council tax and both reduce the footfall in shops, banks, pubs, restaurants and other resources which employ everyone else. So unless we want the whole of NE Fife to be dependent on golf alone, we need the students and the holiday makers to drive our economy.
